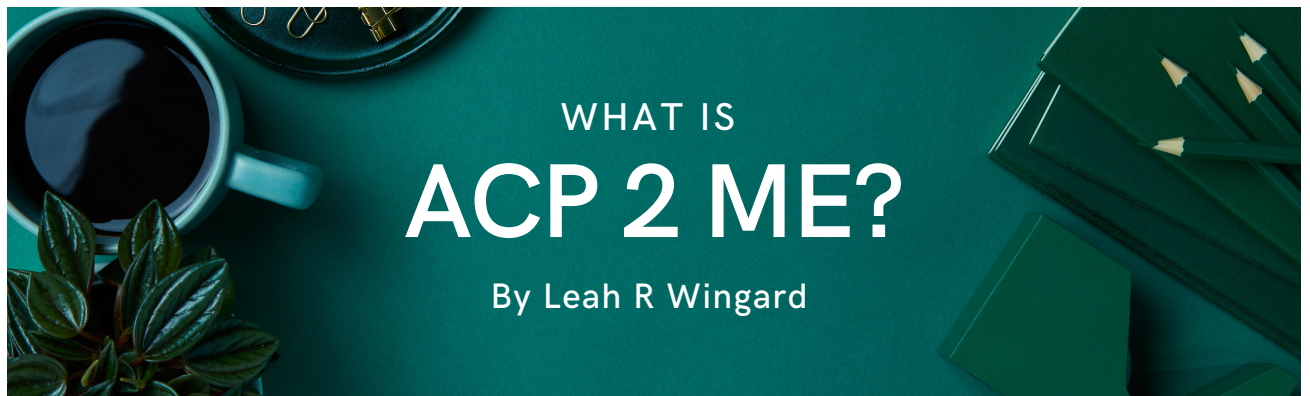


A question came to my mind...
